Lake Glenville Clean-Up Day Saturday June 12, 2004 Clean-up Information

Lake Clean-Up this year is set for Saturday, June 12th from 8:00am to 1pm. We look forward to a great turnout to keep our Lake the most beautiful in the United States. Please come out and enjoy a morning of fun with all the other boats and then join us for lunch at the Pavilion at Buck Knob Landing. Our thanks to Tom and Susan Turner for donating the use of the Pavilion, to Mountain Party Tents and Events for donating the use of the tables and chairs for the lunch, and to Trillium for providing personnel to help with the debris removal. Food and beverages will be provided by Friends of Lake Glenville.

Time and Place

From 8:00 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, June 12. Let's begin collecting trash at the first collection point (Hurricane Creek area—see below) at 8:00 am. Be sure that you have your survey flags for flagging floating obstacles that are too large to load onto your boat.

Overall Plan

This is a little different from last year. Duke is providing a barge for the removal of all debris that can be loaded onto your boats. This barge will be located at specific locations at or near the shoreline at various times during the morning (see below.) Boat owners may do one of two things:

1. Collect debris (see below for a description of what may be collected) around your own shoreline and take it to the ramp on Pine Creek Road where there will be help to remove it.

Relicensing Legal Fund Kick-off a Win-Win

FLG members attending the May breakfast at The Landings at Trillium enthusiastically and generously participated in the launch of our Relicensing Legal Fund campaign with contributions totaling over \$2,100. Relicensing Fund Steering Committee member Carol Adams recognized Steering Committee members in attendance and reported on the procedures for the campaign, noting that solicitation letters would be mailed about May 15th to all members and others in the community. Breakfast attendees were provided with a copy of the solicitation letter and a summary of the legal progress thus far.

Helen Cook, also a steering committee member, conducted the breakfast's contribution launch where contributors at the breakfast selected and then popped a balloon that contained a ticket to choose one of the many prizes available that day. Prizes included bottles of fine wine, home decorative items and various books. With balloons popping throughout the room, it was apparent to all that members generously responded with cash and checks easily increasing the fund from the present \$10,000 level well toward the \$15,000 level and another notch up to our \$50,000 goal.

Cook announced the overall *Win-Win* feature of the fund raising campaign which is a drawing at the conclusion of the direct solicitation campaign phase for two different prizes valued at over \$500. Cook and her business partner David Caples, owners of Amelia Island Florida properties *Elizabeth Point Lodge*, a bed and breakfast, and *Katy's Light*, a 3 bedroom oceanfront lighthouse replica accommo-

The Relicensing process is continuing. Duke submitted their Application for Relicensing of the West Fork Project No. 2686, East Fork Project No. 2698FLG and the Nantahala Project No.26922 in late January. The FERC sent out the Notice of Receipt which was an opportunity to identify issues that should receive additional study. FLG submitted a request for study of the economic basis for spending \$100,000 to build a trail down from the top of the Glenville Dam to the gorge for the small population of class 4 or 5 kayakers vs the benefits to many using Andrews Park. The intent to intervene for nuisance control was also communicated.

While finishing our first official submission to the FERC, we had a change in legal support. Mike Butler, with our approval, asked Philip Marston of Washington, DC to assist. We are paying legal time for only one attorney. Mike became swamped in litigation activity when we were racing a document submission cut-off date. It was a smooth hand off and Phillip did an outstanding job

picking up our activity at the last minute. Phillip has worked at the FERC.

The preliminary intervention and the request for study was filled, on time, with the FERC. The preliminary was to alert FERC that an intervention would be coming later in the schedule. The request for study places a request on Duke to do an economic justification for funding of the Glenville Gorge Kayakers request for trail funds. The next stage in the process will be to comment on the Duke Application. This will include our statement of Intervention and will probably occur during late summer.



1. Congregate at the shoreline near the barge at the allotted times (see below); collect loose debris, then offload it onto the Duke barge which will be anchored near the shoreline (there will also be help on the barge). This will negate the need to have numerous boats trekking to the ramp on Pine Creek Road. The barge will do the bulk of the transport to the Ramp.

I believe it would be better if we all did #2 for the reasons given above, but we don't want to discourage participation if you'd rather just take the debris directly to the ramp. But PLEASE strictly observe the rules as to what can and what cannot be removed.

What Can and Cannot be Removed

Anything that can be loaded onto your boat can be collected, as long as it is not attached to the shoreline. Please bag all small trash either in the orange garbage bags provided or in any large plastic bag.

Any item (logs, trees, large scrub) that cannot be loaded onto

your boat by two people should be tagged with a surveying flag (these will be handed out at the May 15th breakfast or can be picked up at the dock next to Buck Knob Landing on the morning of the clean-up, or can be purchased from a hardware store).

PLEASE DO NOT TOW ANYTHING TO THE BARGE OR TO THE RAMP ON PINECREEK ROAD. We will have no one capable of tying off or removing these large logs/trees. Dale Mosteller, who is the Lake Manager for Duke, will be on the lake two or three days prior to clean up and will be tagging logs and large floating trees for removal or tying securely to the shore. If you know of any such trees that are loose at the shore line and in danger of floating out into the lake, either tag them or call Dale on his cell at 828-506-2449 and he will take care of them. You can do this at any time, but certainly during the clean-up.

Please follow these guidelines closely because we do want to be good citizens and leave whatever brush we can in the lake for fish habitat.

How to Mark Hazardous Floating Material

As indicated above, if this material cannot be loaded onto your boat and then transferred to Duke's barge, please mark this material with the survey flags provided and bring them to the attention of Dale Mosteller on the Duke barge (see phone number above.)

The Barge Collection Locations

These are subject to change but as of now, the barge will be at the following locations during the morning:

8:00 am through 8:45 am—Near Small Island off Little Switzerland (We will collect debris from Trillium down to Hurricane Creek, on both sides of the lake)

9:00 am through 9:45 am—Off Tater Knob, next to the Pavilion at Buck Knob Landing (We will collect debris from Trillium up through Tater Knob, on both sides of the lake and around Buck Knob Island)

10:00 am through 10:45 am—Off the tiny island next to Fenley Forest (We will collect debris from Tater Knob around Still Point up to Admiral's Point on one side and into Norton Creek on the other side)

11:00 am through 11:45 am—Off the entrance to Mill Creek/ Strawberry Hill (We will collect debris from Bill Young's island up to and into Mill Creek)

12:00 am through 1:00 pm—Off the boat ramp at Ralph Andrews Park (We will collect debris from the entrance to Mill Creek up to the dam and into both Pine Creek and Sunset Cove)

Please let's all move up the lake clearing the debris in accordance with the above timetable. If the Hurricane Creek areas is not complete by 8:45 am, we will need to move to the next area, and so on. Please let's try to stay until 1pm so that the residents of Mill Creek and Sunset Cove, who have helped clean up Hurricane Creek etc, are not shortchanged.

If you miss the Barge at the Collection Point

Feel free to take the debris to the ramp on Pine Creek yourself or just wait for the return of the barge.

From 12 pm to 3pm at the Pavilion on Buck Knob Landing. PLEASE be sure to call Jackie Wertymer at 828-743-1116 by June 7th to confirm your attendance at the lunch. Leave your name and how many people will be coming. Feel free to come by boat or car.

Boating Safety Courses

David Leach, Boating Safety Director

As most of you know by now, in order to operate a personal watercraft on the waters of North Carolina, the N.C. General Statutes require that anyone between the age of 12 and 16 years of age must complete a NASBLA-approved Boating Education Course and carry a certification card and proof of age. Quite honestly, I recommend that we all take one of these Boating Safety courses from time to time just to refresh our memories on what the boating rules and etiquette are. I know I need it!

There are two ways to do this:
Attend a Boating Certification Course in person
Pass an on-line Certification Course

In both cases, do the following:

• Go to the website www.ncwildlife.org and check the Boating/ Waterways bar on the left hand side

[For those who would rather navigate the site themselves, don't read any further; for those who would like a blow by blow, I have added step by step instructions below]

- Select Boating News from the top bar
- Select Register for a Boating Education Course on line

To register for the course in person:



Navigation obstacles in the lake have disappeared now that the lake has come up. Can you identify them and remember them next fall or winter if you are out boating then?

• Go down to the Registration section under Instructor-Led Courses and select Jackson County from the pull down list and hit the *Request List* button.

- The list of current courses will appear—there are currently three, one on 5/27 at Cullowhee Fire Dept (828-293-3417), one on 6/1 at Dillsboro Rescue Squad (828-631-1988) and one in Glenville on 7/7 at the Glenville Rescue Squad (828-293-3417).
- If you wish to register, select the course and call the number given above to register

To Sit and, hopefully, Pass an On-Line Certification Course:

- Go to the bottom of the screen and select Boat-ed.com under OnLine Courses
- This will take you to the Boat-ed.com website where you can then study for the course and take it at your leisure for \$15 (the in-person course is free, provides personal attention and there is no exam). You must score 80% to pass and your certificate takes 5 to 7 days to arrive. There is no limit to how many times you can take it but you do have to pay each time!

I hope you enjoy the course, however you decide to take it, and I hope to see you all on the lake this year. Have a great Spring and Summer and happy, and safe, boating!

dation that sleeps 8, have donated a 2-night/3-day stay at the winner's choice of either property. II. Where do we go from here?

I. Status of the Application: "Filed" with FERC, but not yet "accepted for filing"

On January 26, 2004, Duke filed its re-licensing application (Application) with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), approximately three weeks after it had filed an offer of settlement signed by a number of interested organizations.

Friends of Lake Glenville, of course, decide not sign the proposed settlement and will be contesting it before the FERC. The docket number of the Application, which is the key to tracking developments at the FERC, is P-2686.

FERC issued a notice of the Application and invited any comments on additional studies that should be done before the application can be deemed "accepted' for filing and hence before the FERC begins its actual review of the merits of the terms and conditions of the requested new license.

In response, the Friends of Lake Glenville intervened in the proceeding in late March, making the group a "party" to the proceeding. At this early stage in the proceeding, there was no need to go into detail on the substantive objections to Duke's application, but merely to state the group's general interest (in order to support its intervention) and to urge a number of additional studies to be done at Duke's expense to buttress certain

The FERC is reviewing the comments filed in late March (by us as well as by Jackson County). FERC is expected to issue a notice in the coming weeks that will probably focus solely on any additional studies required to complete the application and, if it concludes that the application is complete, will accept the Application for filing and set a deadline for interventions by any interested member of the public. That filing deadline will probably be about three weeks after the Commission notice. At that point, any other interested persons may file a protest, an intervention or other comment.

We anticipate voicing our substantive concerns (detailed below) in response to that notice.

Question: Can individual members of the public voice their concerns without becoming a party?

Answer: Absolutely. Letters may be addressed to the Commission's Secretary, referencing the project number P-2686. Letters may be addressed to the Chairman or other Commissioners as well, but as a practical matter, unless there is a large number of them (say, over 50), they are likely to be simply forwarded to the Secretary's office for filing. They will, however, become part of the record in the proceeding and will be read by the Commission staff.

The Social Side

Water Quality

Thanks to our water sampling volunteers, samples from the five major inflows plus two other sites have been collected and taken to the Ashville Lab each month during the fall, winter and spring months. It's wonderful to have such dedicated volunteers. The Lab results have been received by e-mail. And , each month, the results are reviewed for consistency and deviations. Fortunately we seldom see significant changes.

It is always refreshing to see the monthly results that show the water quality of our inflowing stream remaining typical for mountain streams and also remaining consistent. The noted fluctuations are usually due to larger rain and snow runoff.
